



How to Use This Journal

his journal is designed for in-depth Bible study. While devotional-reading the Bible is good and strongly encouraged, this journal may frustrate you if you seek to use it as a devotional guide. The *Bible Study Simplified Journal* is designed to guide you through a process of in-depth Bible study of a specific passage of Scripture. This journal is best used by spending an extended period of time, even several days, studying a specific passage of the Bible.

The Bible Study Simplified method follows four basic steps:

- **READ.** We first begin by reading and understanding the broader context of the passage we are studying.
- **EXPLORE.** Next, we seek to explore the details of the passage we are studying to clearly understand what the passage is saying.
- **EXPLAIN.** After understanding the context and exploring the details of the passage, we can begin to explain the meaning of the passage.
- **APPLY.** Finally, good Bible study always ends with seeking to apply what we have learned to our own lives.


The *Bible Study Simplified Journal* guides you through these four steps and provides space to capture your notes from your study.

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What is Emphasized in the Passage?

Pay attention to why the author uses any transition words: therefore, so that, that, in order that, but you, for, to, but. Is there any repetition? Can you observe the overall structure of the passage you are studying?

Therefore (2:1): Paul has instructed them to conduct themselves in a way worthy of the gospel; strive for the gospel; the Philippians will believe and suffer for the gospel

Therefore (2:12): connection between Jesus exaltation or death and working out our salvation


